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## <u>JEWISH FOUNDATION FOR RIGHTEOUS PARTNERS WITH 2 NJ GROUPS FOR SPECIAL VETERANS DAY PROGRAM</u>

EDISON, New Jersey – The Jewish Foundation for the Righteous (JFR) in partnership with the Jewish Community Center (JCC) of Middlesex County and the Jewish Federation in the Heart of New Jersey, will present an evening honoring Jewish War Veterans on Nov. 15<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. at the JCC's campus, 1775 Oak Tree Road. The event will feature Pastor Chris Edmonds, the son of Master Sgt. Roddie Edmonds, who will recount not only the story of his father's heroism in saving the lives of 200 Jewish American soldiers but also of how the younger Edmonds discovered his father's heroism years after his passing.

To date, Master Sgt. Roddie Edmonds is the only American soldier who has been recognized as "Righteous Among the Nations" by Yad Vashem, Israel's Holocaust Remembrance Center.

The program will include a screening of the JFR's award-winning short documentary, "Following the Footsteps of My Father," which recounts the inspirational story of rescue through the lens of Pastor Edmonds as well as several of the American Jewish POWs saved by the late Master Sgt.

On Dec. 19, 1944, Master Sgt. Edmonds was captured by the German Army during the Battle of the Bulge and sent to the Stalag IXA prisoner of war camp. As the highest-ranking American soldier in the camp, Edmonds was responsible for the camp's 1,292 American POWs. The camp's commandant ordered Edmonds to identify the Jewish soldiers in order to separate them from the other prisoners. Instead, Edmonds refused, and when the German commandant placed his pistol against Edmonds' head, demanding that he identify the Jewish soldiers,

Edmonds responded, "We are all Jews here," refusing to identify the Jewish soldiers thereby saving their lives.

He survived 100 days of captivity, and returned home after the war, but never spoke of his actions. Edmonds passed away in 1985, and only long after did his son, Pastor Edmonds begin to put together the story of his father's heroism during the war. Posthumously, Edmond's actions have been recognized by Yad Vashem, who have conferred him with the designation "Righteous Among the Nations."

"As we mark Veterans Day and remember the heroic sacrifices made by those who have served in our Armed Forces, we would be remiss not to remember Master Sgt. Edmonds, the only U.S. Soldier to have been recognized as 'Righteous Among the Nations,'" said JFR Executive Vice President Stanlee Stahl. "With a gun aimed at his head, he chose to stand tall in the face of adversity and save over 200 soldiers who were able to return home and build their families, careers and lives. His legacy will forever stand tall in the histories told of the Greatest Generation."
