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28 HOLOCAUST EDUCATORS FROM 13 U.S. STATES RECEIVE COVETED LERNER FELLOWSHIPS

THE JEWISH FOUNDATION FOR THE RIGHTEOUS PROVIDES EDUCATORS WITH INSTRUCTION ON TEACHING HOLOCAUST EDUCATION TO THEIR STUDENTS

ELIZABETH, New Jersey – The Jewish Foundation for the Righteous (JFR) has selected 28 middle and high school teachers and Holocaust center staff from 13 states as 2023 Alfred Lerner Fellows to delve into the complex history of the Holocaust as well as discuss new teaching techniques for introducing the subject of the Holocaust into their classrooms. The Fellows participated in the JFR's Summer Institute for Teachers, an intensive five-day course that took place at the Hilton Newark Airport from June 24 through June 28.

The program is a high-level, intensive academic seminar in which participants are exposed to noted Holocaust scholars, including: Doris Bergen of the University of Toronto; Benjamin Hett of Hunter College; renowned author and historian Rebecca Erbelding; Peter Hayes of Northwestern University; Lawrence R. Douglas of Amherst College; Steven Field of New York University's Grossman School of Medicine; Avinoam Patt of the University of Connecticut; Edward B. Westermann of Texas A&M University and Robert Jan van Pelt of the University of Waterloo. It is designed to allow participants to meet in small groups following each lecture, address the specific aspect of the Holocaust that is presented, share teaching concepts and develop approaches to introducing the subject matter to their students.

Teachers selected for the program must be English or social studies teachers at the middle or high school level, have taught for at least five years, are at least five years from retirement and currently teach the Holocaust in their classroom.

"There are three main goals of the JFR's Summer Institute, which include: providing teachers with a graduate level course on the Holocaust; pedagogical connections with other

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teachers and their curriculum so they learn what has worked and what has not; and to give them additional resources for the classroom," said JFR Executive Vice President Stanlee Stahl.

The nationally acclaimed Fellowship program is named in memory of Alfred Lerner, the founding chairman and chief executive officer of MBNA Corporation, who died in October 2002. Lerner was a long-time advisor and supporter of JFR programs and activities. His deep commitment to the work of JFR and in particular to his special interest in the field of Holocaust education led to the seminar being endowed in his name.

The JFR continues its work of providing monthly financial assistance to more than 110 aged and needy Righteous Gentiles, living in 11 countries.
